Boy Scouting

201) Den Chief Training – A Den Chief is a Boy Scout, Varsity Scout, or Venturer who assists with a Cub Scout Den or Webelos Den. This is an approved leadership position toward rank advancement in Boy Scouts. Participants should be Second Class or higher or have been a scout for a minimum of one full year. The Scout's Scoutmaster should verify that the Scout meets the minimum requirements to take this course. This training is designed for the Den Chief. However, all adult leaders who recruit or work with Den Chiefs (e.g. Den Leaders or Cubmasters) are encouraged to attend to learn more about the program. Any Scoutmaster wishing to learn more about this leadership position is also encouraged to attend.

The Den Chief who completes this training will be better able to function within a Cub Scout Den and Pack as a role model. He will be better equipped to effectively assist the Den Leader with planning and conducting den meetings, working with Cub Scouts or Webelos with their advancements, and promoting Scouting in general and the local troop in particular. They will gain an understanding of the Cub Scouting program and the differences between Cub Scouting and Boy Scouting. Learning objectives include: the Den Chief's role, Understanding Boys in a Den, the Den Meeting Structure and Activities, and having FUN.

Participants need to bring the Den Chief Handbook (available at the Scout Shop) to this training. A notebook and writing instrument are also required. Trudy Falgoust **Session 2-4**

Master of Commissioner Science Degree (MCS)

1. Prerequisite - Current registered Commissioner and earned Arrowhead Honor. Completion of Bachelor degree or awarded Commissioner's Key.
2. Requirements – Complete 7 additional courses (total 14) with at least 7 at the Master level.
3. Performance – Approval of District Commissioner and District Executive.

Doctor of Commissioner Science Degree (DCS)

1. Prerequisite - Current registered Commissioner and earned Master degree and awarded Commissioner's Key.
2. Requirements – Complete 10 additional courses (total 24) with at least 5 at the Doctor level. Complete thesis or research project approved by designated committee.
3. Performance – Approval of District Commissioner and District Executive. Serve on College faculty for at least one year and recruit at least 3 new Commissioners.
